1. Use slower speech and simple sentences

Dyslexic students often learn better when more than one sense is activated, use hands-on activities to reinforce lessons.



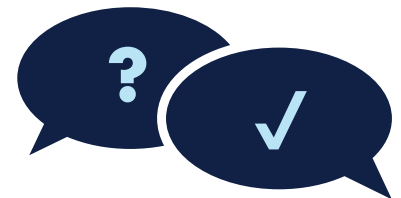
3. Consider grading differently for spelling
